

Special Presentation during September

Trump: The Making of a Demagogue

Date: Tuesday 17 September 2024, 11:00am-12:30pm (during term break)

Presenter: Quentin Beresford Venue: Online meeting (Zoom)



As everyone knows, Donald Trump is standing for re-election to the US presidency against the background of his controversial conduct during both his first term and afterwards.

In the lecture Quentin asks the basic question: what made Donald Trump into such a controversial and, for many, such a dangerous political figure? He examines Trump as an authoritarian, a demagogue and a narcissist and examine how he came to operate in this way. Quentin will also examine Trump's troubled family background, his involvement in his father's controversial real estate business and how he built his own business profile on lies and exaggeration. With clever use of marketing, personal branding and media exposure he acquired the status of a celebrity. But, behind the façade, is Trump's long list of business failures and his insatiable need for attention and power.

About the Speaker

Quentin Beresford had a 30-year career as Professor at Edith Cowan University in Perth teaching a wide variety of politics and history courses, including American politics. He's lived for several extended periods of time in the US. He retired in 2019 and taught at U3A in Noosa before moving to Brisbane. Quentin is also an author. His last two books were *Wounded Country The Murray-Darling Basin: A Contested History* (2021) and *Rogue Corporations: Inside Australia's Biggest Business Scandals* (2023). He's an Adjunct Professor of Politics at the University of the Sunshine Coast.

Monday (face to face class) E12 – US Presidential Elections

If you are interested in politics, and particularly the upcoming American Elections, then you won't want to miss attending Quentin Beresford's four-week course that offers an opportunity to study a US presidential election in real time. It is one of the most consequential elections in recent memory. Republican, Donald Trump's authoritarian agenda threatens the future of democracy in America, along with America's role as a leader of the West. Democratic candidate, Kamala Harris, is advocating a progressive agenda but her leadership style and qualities have not been fully tested. Already there have been twists and turns as the election has gathered steam: the assassination attempt on Trump and the stepping aside of President Joe Biden. Whatever the outcome, American presidential elections are unrivalled political theatre with consequential outcomes for the future of the country and the world.

Monday (Zoom class)

G01 - Making a Family Tree

We will investigate techniques to build your family tree using your computer from your own home. You will only need your parents' birth details, name, date and place and death details if they have passed. Having your grandparents' details will make it easier.

Tuesday (Zoom class)

H42 - Feared diseases in History.

Feared Diseases in History is the history and science of infectious diseases. The focus is on infectious diseases that have had a significant impact on history or are feared for other reasons such as plague, smallpox, influenza, cholera, malaria, tuberculosis, and leprosy.

Wednesday

E14 – Australian Political Institutions (face to face class)

In this course the enduring institutions of the Australian political system are considered with reference to the national government, the Queensland government, and the Brisbane City Council. Using the American textbook "Political institutions in the USA" comparisons will be drawn with a republican system of government.

B49 – Cooking for a Budget for one or two (face to face class)

Bread, soups, stir fries, take a bunch of ingredients, and turn them into a wonderful meal.

B50 – Food and minor Crafts for your grandchildren (face to face class)

Want to engage with your grandchildren, cook with them or make something – join this class and find out how easy and rewarding this can be for all involved.

Thursday

T05 - Second Wind, Rich Insights into making the most of Later Life (face to face class)

This is a discussion course based around a survey by the tutor of 101 Australians aged 65 to 94 about what they have learned as they make the journey into older age. Instead of a focus on successful ageing, it is about how we can best adapt to our personal circumstances for SUCCESSFUL LIVING as we grow older.

Y04 – Life, the Universe and Everything (face to face class)

The core business of philosophy is to grapple with perennial puzzles about the world and the way that it's experienced. Many philosophical puzzles can be understood as differences between left and right hemisphere modes of experience.

Brisbane U3A Artist, Sandy Dunstan, reflects on her entry in The Bradley Portrait Prize

A couple of years ago I was fortunate enough to discover a U3A group that met in New Farm Park and whose prime object was to create portraits as an expressive art form — an absorbing interest of mine. I emailed Carol, the class tutor, asking to be considered for the next intake of participants. To my delight she called me and said I could start immediately. Thus began a delightful association which continues to this day. As a group, we are a diverse lot, but the work produced is inspiring and the variety of style and focus of interest is a joy to behold. Fundamentally,

and individually, the group has an ongoing commitment and willingness to explore possibilities.

The Bradley Portrait Prize experience for our group is a prime example of this. I wasn't with the group when this art exhibition was established three years ago but have had the pleasure of participating for the last two. Last year, Carol, our wonderfully organised and intuitive guide had her work recognized, and her entry of Jenny Woodward is now on the cover of the CWA 2025 calendar that was launched this year.

The first Bradley Portrait Prize Exhibition attracted approximately 50 entries. It started off local, then state-wide, but this year, with Costa Georgiadis as the subject, it went national and over 450 entries were received from all over Australia. Undeterred, ten of our group submitted entries and they were exhibited at ABC Studios at Southbank. I entered this painting that is basically about Costa's life so far.

The painting is littered with symbols. Over his left shoulder there is Bondi Beach where he has enjoyed surfing. He's wearing board shorts to emphasise this point. The chicken clutched in his left hand is symbolic of his interest in the natural world. He holds the national floral emblem of Greece -Acanthus Mollis - in his right hand as a reminder of his Greek heritage. The wattle sprig next to it signals his connection to Australia. His second image peers through foliage as he sometime does in his role as TV presenter on "Gardening Australia." Below that, the rocks at the bottom of the painting remind the viewer of the time he spent overseas landscaping as he continued to do, for a time, on his return to Australia. The oversized sunflower indicates his positive, energetic commitment to and interest in all things living. The unfurled flower budding front of this signifies the potentially stirring and fascinating things that will, without a doubt, unfold in his future. Overall, it was important to have vibrant colour throughout to highlight the scintillating authenticity of his personality.





Theatre Profile: Ipswich Little Theatre since 1946


This theatre was originally called the Little Incinerator Theatre as it is held in the old incinerator designed by Walter Burleigh Griffin in the 1920's. It seats an intimate 80 patrons. They also have the Jean Pratt building close by, which they also utilise as a theatre.

Their plays have always been good fun; the last theatre restaurant was a spoof on Star Wars and performed well on the small stage with tasty food. Prior to, and at intermission, you can pre-purchase your intermission drinks and eats. They're a wonderful team in the open air 'green room'.

Prices are - Adult \$25/Concession \$21/Membership \$35

Due to the size of the theatre and the fact that they now sell tickets to all shows from the beginning of the year, it would be prudent to get their programme for 2025 in about November and plot and plan your season for the year. There are always some seats still available at the time, but you'll have to be quick!
